



ROAD SAFETY

Chains, Ice, and Sanding

- Vehicles are required to have tire chains or traction control devices during operation on County roads per Calaveras County Ordinance No. 2519
- Sanding may take place to maintain main roads and school bus routes
- Ice-scraping operations only take place during daylight hours when temperatures are higher and snow becomes slushy

Public Works does NOT provide individual or on-call snowplow services.

Parking or standing of vehicles on the County right-of-way during snow removal is prohibited. CHP will cite and/or remove any such vehicle.

RESIDENT SAFETY

- Carry a survival kit in case of vehicle breakdown or becoming stuck in the snow. **Blankets/Sleeping Bag, Small Shovel, Flashlight**
- Children and pets are not to play in the streets or on burms
- Always carry chains
- Snowplows make frequent stops and back up maneuvers. Do not drive up behind the snowplows
- Do not shovel or move snow from driveways into the roadway

EMERGENCIES

SNOWPLOW OPERATIONS

Snow Depth

- 3" on roadways in Arnold, West Point, Glencoe, Avery, Rail Road Flat, and Mountain Ranch
- 2" on roadways in Camp Connell

Route Priority

- Main roads providing access to state highways and collector routes
- School bus routes

BERMS

The creation of berms are unavoidable due to the turning limitation of plows and must be removed by the resident.
